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# Introduction

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## *Description of the OMI (OMNEO Matrix Interface) Card*

The OMI (OMNEO Matrix Interface) card set for RTS ADAM and ADAM-M intercom frames provides fully IP compliant connectivity into the ADAM intercom BUS for OMNEO compatible devices. The card set consists of a back card and front card and supports fiber optic cabling (through the use of optional fiber modules) and RJ45 copper Ethernet connections.

OMNEO is a fully Layer 3 compliant media-networking architecture, uniting devices normally inaccessible without time-consuming and expensive cabling projects, planned weeks or months ahead of the implementation of the actual system. OMNEO fully supports currently available network infrastructure to provide low cost of implementation. OMNEO also provides extremely low latency and high audio fidelity which make it usable in virtually any application.

OMNEO employs Audinate's Dante, a standards-based, routable IP media transport technology, and OCA (Open Control Architecture) as the control protocol, which is a proposed open public standard used for control and monitoring of professional media networks. Together this allows for the freedom to assemble from 2 to 10,000 cooperating devices that can exchange studio-quality, synchronized, multi-channel audio and share common control systems.

OMNEO also supports the current AVB (Audio/Video Bridging) standards and can take advantage of the special features of AVB switches and networking hardware.

Through the use of multiple open standards, OMI provides an ideal solution for Layer 2 or Layer 3 media networking within a variety of IT infrastructures.

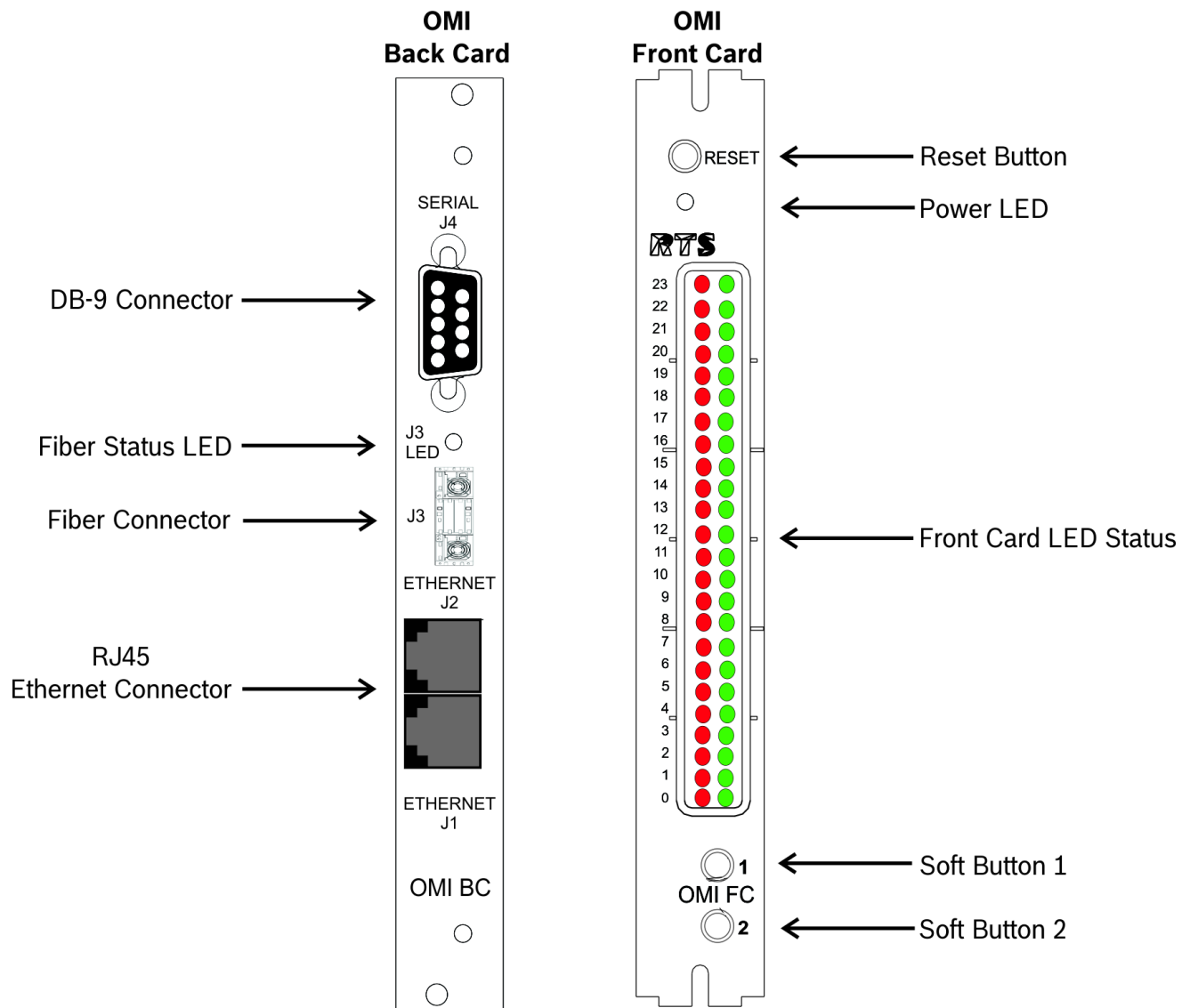


FIGURE 1. OMI Reference View

Remove the card from the frame in order to change any dip switch settings. Any changes are not valid until the card is reset.

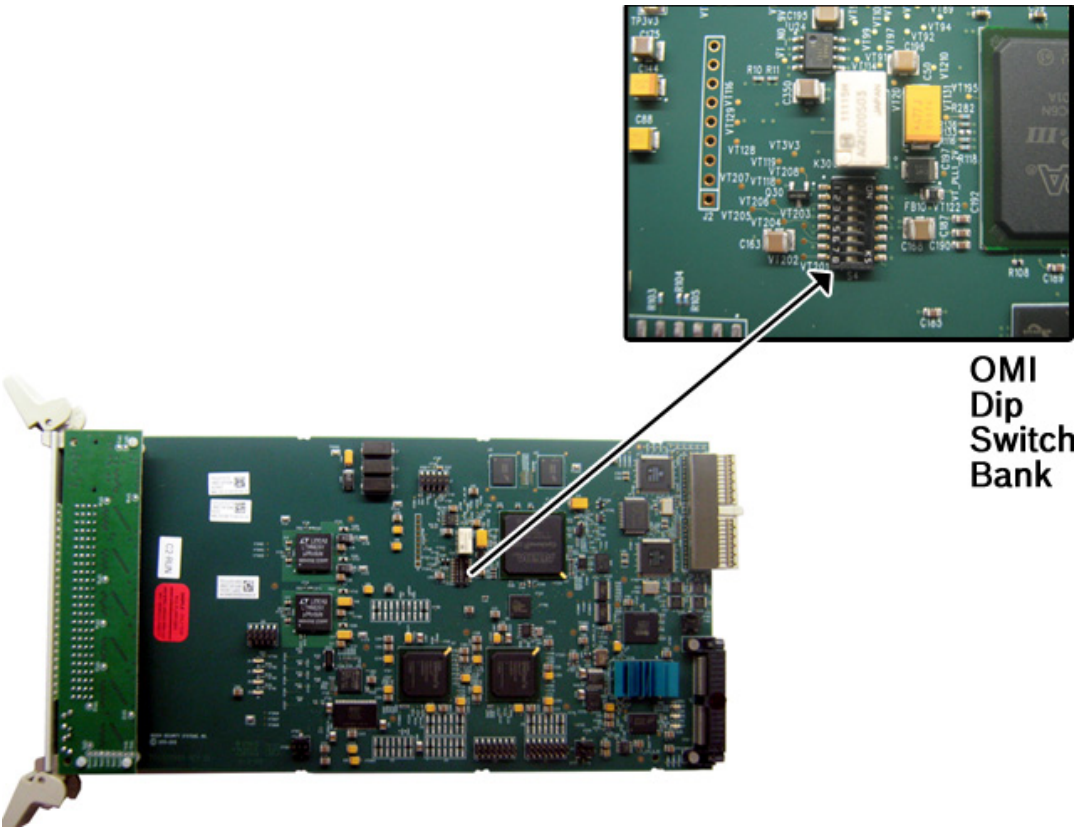


FIGURE 2. OMI DIP Switch Bank

## *OMI System Configurations*

Currently, the OMNEO technology supports Single Subnet and Simple VLAN configurations. In the future larger system setups will be supported.

### **OMNEO General Constraints**

- Single subnets cannot exceed 128 OMNEO devices
- The maximum number of hops between source and destination is seven (7)
- The maximum number of nodes in a daisy chained system is 20

### **System Recommendations**

#### *Single Subnet*

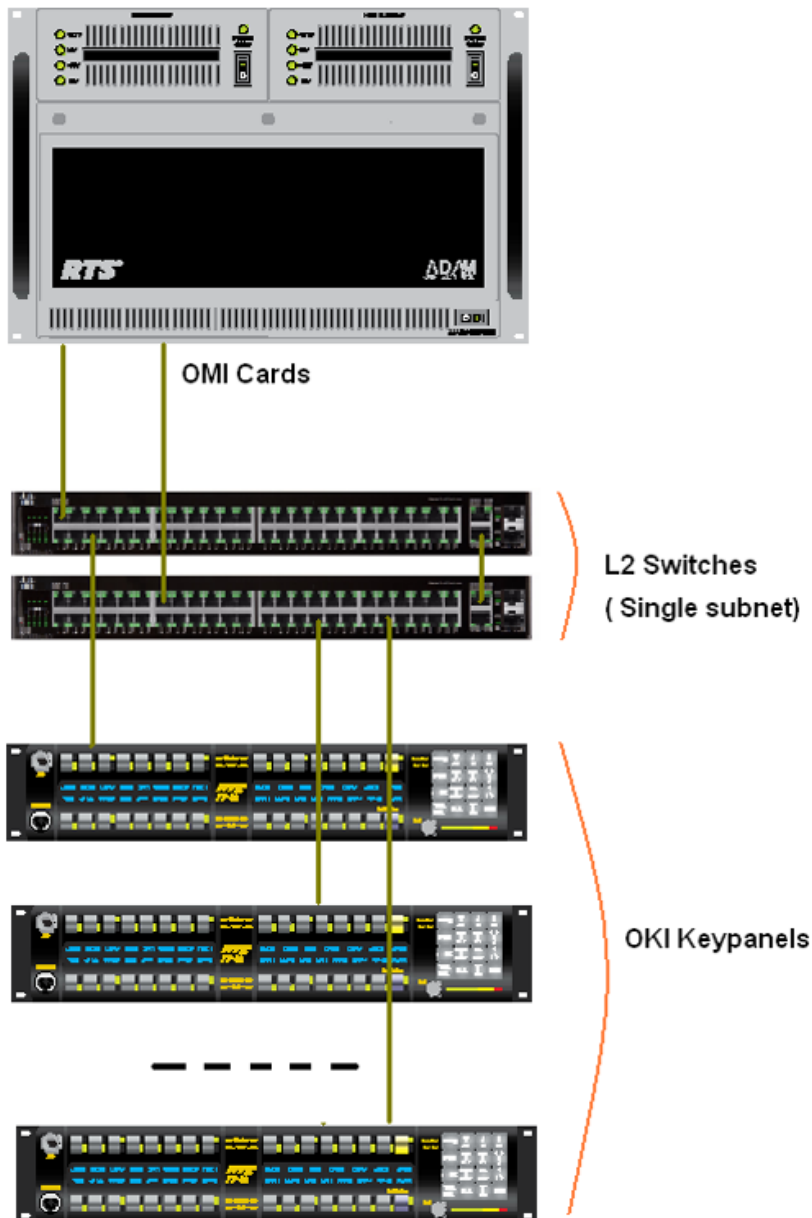
- Use the MCII-e as the DHCP server

#### *VLAN Subnet*

- The two (2) MCII-e cards in the frame should be configured as active and standby DHCP servers for any OMNEO devices attached to the respective frame.

## Single Subnet System Drawing

The Single Subnet System below contains two (2) OMI cards in one (1) frame and two (2) Layer 2 Switches trunked together and capable of supporting up to 124 OKI keypanels (4 ports are used by the 2 OMI cards Audio IN and OUT). This system uses Zero Configuration.



**FIGURE 3.** OMNEO Single Subnet System

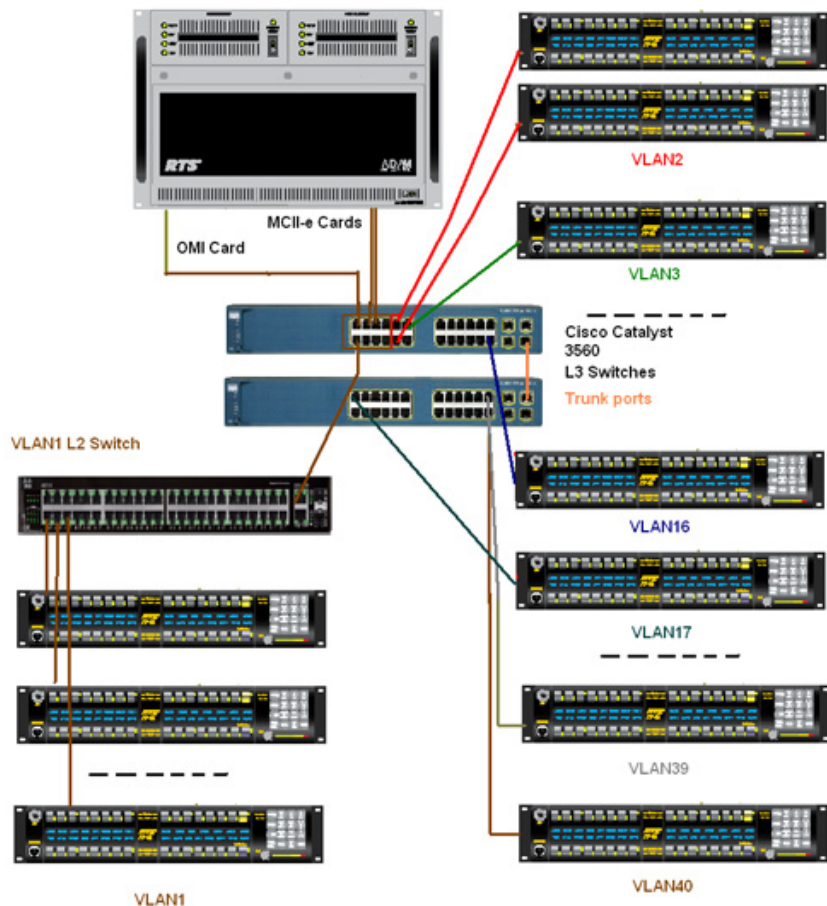
## VLAN System Drawing

In the System drawing (Figure 4), one (1) OMI card is shown supporting VLAN1 through VLAN 40 in a more complex system diagram. There are two (2) MCII-e cards being used as redundant DHCP servers, meaning that if one fails, the other takes over the DHCP responsibilities. There are two (2) Layer 3 switches connected creating trunked ports creating communication between all the VLANs. Also connected to the two (2) Layer 3 switches is a Layer 2 switch that is acting as a VLAN for multiple keypanels.

**IMPORTANT:** The system diagram shows only one (1) OMI card installed, which means only 64 ports are available for audio transmittal. Adding additional OMI cards can add more ports for use.

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*Installation of the OMI Card into the ADAM and ADAM M System*

The following firmware versions are the minimum required for OMI support:

- AZedit version 4.5.0 or later
- IPedit version 3.0.0 or later
- MCII-e version 2.9 or later
- Bonjour<sup>1</sup> (on the network)
- Firmware Upload Tool 2.4 or later

When inserting the OMI in the ADAM/ADAM M system, the following considerations need to be made:

- Gently insert the OMI into the slot. If the card is forced or twisted while inserting, a pin on the backplane could short or break causing the card/frame to become inoperable.
- When inserting the OMI into the ADAM/ADAM M system, make sure to insert the card into a compatible backcard. If the card is inserted into an incompatible backcard, undesirable results can occur.
- DO NOT FORCE MATING CARDS

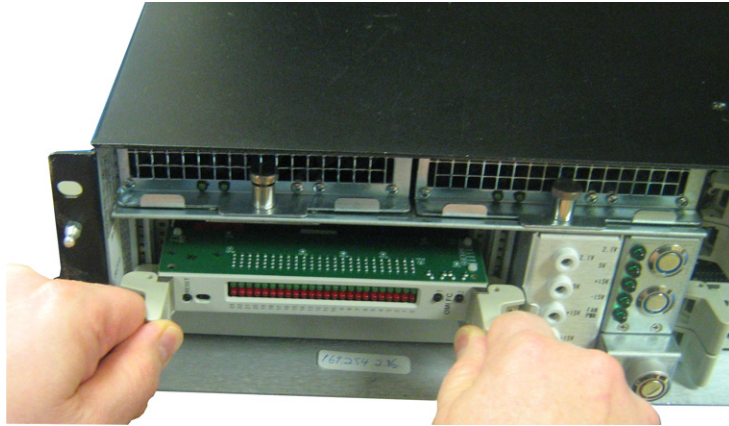
## ADAM M Installation

**IMPORTANT:** Up to four (4) OMI card sets can be used in an ADAM M frame at a time.

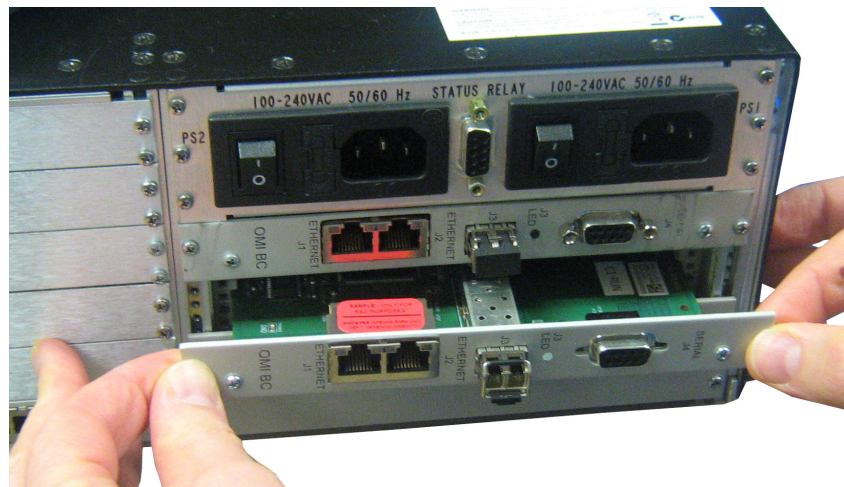
To install the OMI card set into the ADAM M frame, do the following:

1. Gently insert the **OMI front card** into the appropriate ADAM M slot.

**NOTE:** Take care to insert the card properly, as shown.



2. Using the card ejectors, tighten down the **front card** by pushing it into the slot.
3. On the back of the ADAM M frame, carefully insert the **OMI back card**, aligning it with the OMI front card, as shown below.



4. Ensure the **OMI back card is seated properly against the OMI front card** and is sitting firmly in the frame.
5. Using a screwdriver and the supplied screws, tighten the **OMI back card to the frame**.
6. Ensure the **card ejectors are tightened to the chassis** on the OMI front card.

## ADAM Frame Installation

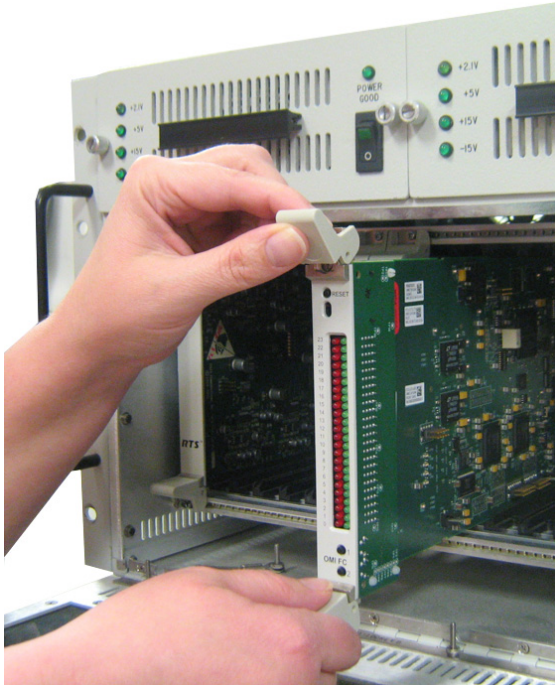

To **install the OMI card set into the ADAM frame**, do the following:

1. Gently insert the **OMI front card** into the appropriate ADAM slot.
2. Using the card ejectors, tighten down the **front card**.



3. On the back of the ADAM frame, carefully insert the **OMI back card**, aligning it with the OMI front card.
4. Ensure the **OMI back card is seated properly against the OMI front card** and is sitting firmly in the frame.



5. Using the supplied screws, tighten the **OMI back card to the frame**.
6. Ensure the **card ejectors are tightened to the chassis** on the OMI front card.



## *OMI Card Channel Allocation*

---

### Port Allocation

The **Port Allocation Table** is used to support I/O cards with more than 16 ports. It allows you to select which card types occupy which intercom slots and which ports are allocated to each card. Ports can be allocated in groups of four (4). Each group contains 16 ports. Each OMI or MADI card can have no more than 64 ports per card. For more information, see “Assigning Ports” on page 60.

**NOTE:** If you are running a single frame system, the single frame can hold up to 880 ports; if you are running a multi-frame Tribus system, you are limited to 256 ports per frame.

### Slot Column

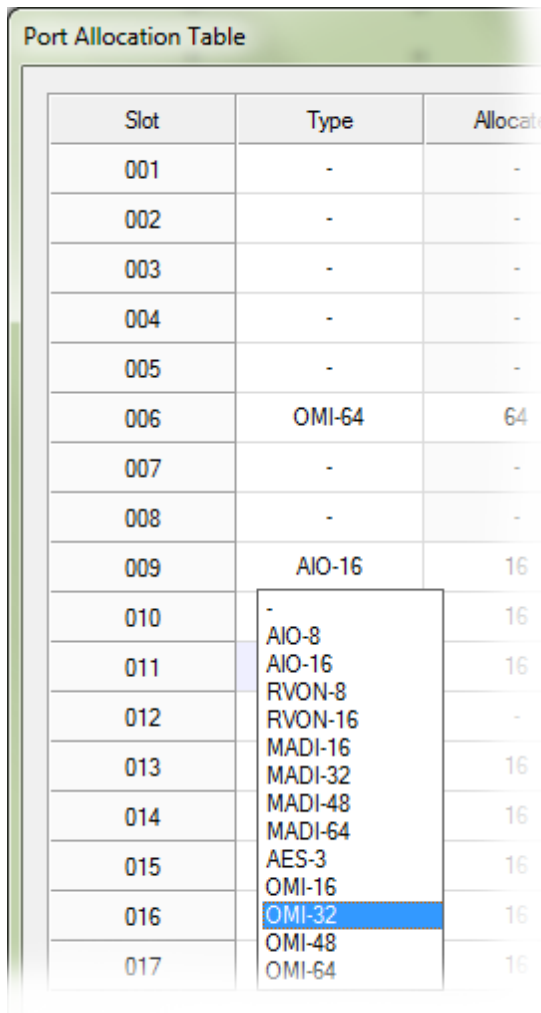
The **Slot** column displays the number of the slot where the card resides.

This field cannot be modified.

## Type Column

The **Type** column is used to select the type of card in the slot. Use the drop down menu to select the type of card in the slot.

Available options are: *AIO-8*, *AIO-16*, *RVON-8*, *RVON-16*, *MADI-16*, *MADI-32*, *MADI-48*, *MADI-64*, *AES-3*, OMI-16, OMI-32, OMI-48, and OMI-64.

Allocated Column

The **Allocated** column is used to select the number of ports to allocate. Use the drop down menu to select the number of ports you want to allocate.

Available options are:

- 8 - Used to allocate 8 ports
- 8+8 - Used to allocate 16 ports
- 16 - Used to allocate 16 ports
- 24 - Used to allocate 24 ports
- 32 - Used to allocate 32 ports
- 40 - Used to allocate 40 ports
- 48 - Used to allocate 48 ports
- 56 - Used to allocate 56 ports
- 64 - Used to allocate 64 ports

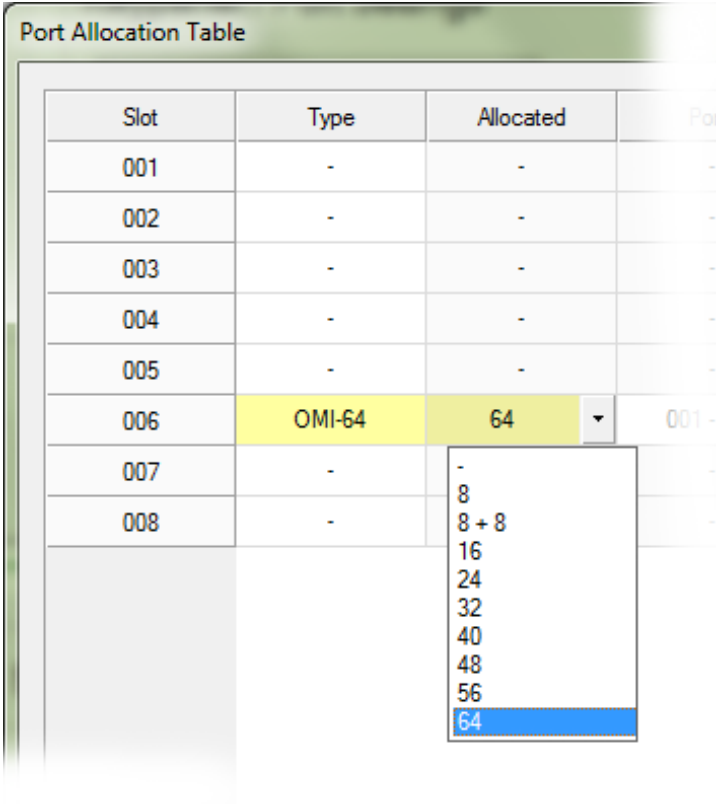


FIGURE 7. Allocated Column Options



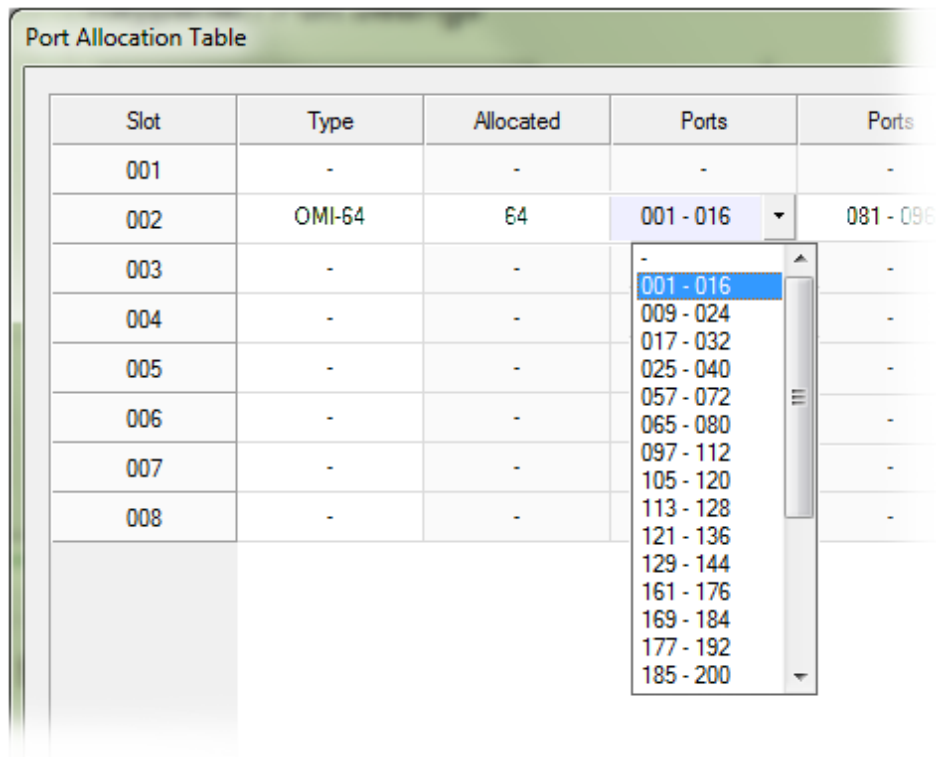
### Ports Columns (4)

The **Ports** column is used to assign ports in either groups of eight (8) or 16 ports, depending on what is selected in the Allocated column.

Up to four (4) groups of 16 ports are allowed.

**TIP:** To assist in setup and configuration debug, assign consecutive port numbers for multi-group port columns.

**NOTE:** The Ports column only becomes active for the number of ports you are allocating. For example, if you have 32 ports, only the first two (2) Ports columns are enabled.

Warning Column

The **Warning** column displays a warning when configured card types do not match detected card types and when not all ports are allocated (for a given card, or for the intercom as a whole).

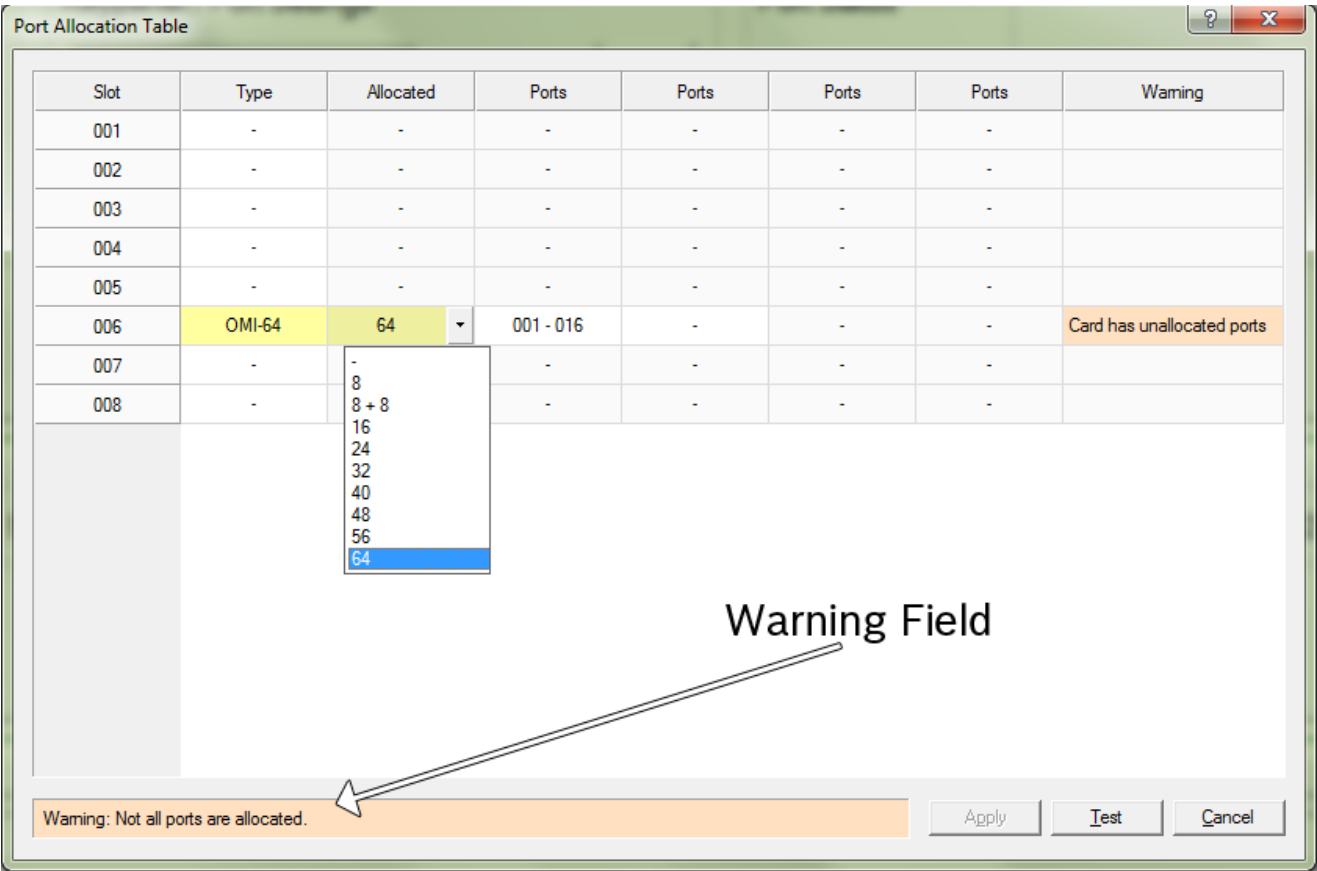


FIGURE 9. Warning Column and Warning Field

Warning Field

The **Warning** field displays warnings pertaining to the intercom system as a whole.

Apply Button

The **Apply** button is used to apply any modifications made to the port allocation table to the intercom system while the window remains open.

Test Button

The **Test** button is used to test the modifications you made to the port allocation table before you apply it to the intercom system. A message displays when the test is finished notifying you if the port allocation table is valid or not.

Cancel Button

The **Cancel** button is used to close the window without implementing any of the modifications made to the port allocation window.

## Window Descriptions

### OMNEO Configuration Window

The **OMNEO Configuration** window in AZedit is used to configure the OMI device for communication with other OMNEO devices on the network.

## Settings for OMNEO Card Group Box

---

### *OMNEO Card Drop Down Menu*

The **OMNEO Card** drop down menu is used to select the slot of the OMI card you want to configure.

### *Device Name Field*

The **Device Name** field is used to enter a recognizable name for the OMI card. By default, the card is given an alphanumeric name, such as CAP6-0000e7.

This field can contain *up to 20 characters*.

### *Use Static IP Settings Check Box*

The **Use Static IP Settings** check box is used to enable Static IP Addressing. Static IP Addressing involves assigning an IP Address, a Netmask, a Gateway Address, a DNS Server, and a Domain for the device.

Once selected, the following fields become active:

- IP Address
- Netmask
- Gateway
- DNS Server 1 (only required if ARNI device is present)
- Domain (only required if ARNI device is present)

**NOTE:** If the Use Static IP Settings check box is not selected the card uses the DHCP server. If no DHCP server is configured, then the OMI card uses Zero Configuration.

The OMI card supports Zero Configuration Addressing. This means when there is no DHCP Server configured and Static IP settings have not been enabled, the card pings the other devices on the network in search of an IP Address that will work on the network. For more information, see “Zero Configuration” on page 65.

### *IP Address Field*

The **IP Address** field is used to enter the IP Address of the OMI card.

---

### ***Controller IP Field***

The **Controller IP** field is used to enter the IP Address used by the OMI-Controller to access the network. The Controller is used to set up audio connections between two (2) OMI cards, an OMI card and OKI keypanel or between an OMI card and OEI-2 device. Configuration is done through AZedit or IPedit. This address must be in the same subnet as the Audio IP field.

By default the controller assigns an IP Address in the link local range of 169.254.0.0/16. If there is a DHCP server in the same subnet, both take IP Addresses from the DHCP Server.

The controller and the audio device are tightly coupled. Failure to communicate between them may cause the board to malfunction.

### ***Audio IP Field***

The **Audio IP** field is used to enter the IP Address used to transmit and receive audio across the network.

By default, audio devices assign themselves IP Address in the link local range of 169.254.0.0/16. If there is a DHCP server in the same subnet, it takes an IP Address from the DHCP Server.

The controller and the audio device are tightly coupled. Failure to communicate between the controller and the audio device may cause the board to malfunction.

---

**IMPORTANT:** If using OMI v 4.0.5 and AZedit v 4.6.0 OR IPedit 3.0.2 or earlier, the assigned IP Address is given to the audio device. The controller automatically assigns itself the next highest IP Address (Audio device's IP Address plus one (1)).

If using OMI v 4.0.6 and AZedit v 4.7.0 OR IPedit v 3.1.0 or later, this address must be in the same subnet as the Controller IP field.

---

### ***Netmask Field***

The **Netmask** field is used to enter the Netmask Address of the OMI card.

### ***Gateway Field***

The **Gateway** field is used to enter the Gateway Address, if applicable, of the OMI card.

### ***DNS Server 1 Field***

The **DNS Server 1** field is used to enter the **DNS** (Domain Name Server) Server address the OMI card can access.

### ***Domain Field***

The **Domain** field is used to enter the domain in which the OMI card resides.

## **Ethernet Settings**

Ethernet settings for each port are displayed if the network cable is attached to the port. These fields cannot be modified.

## Settings for Connected Devices Group Box

---

### *Local Channel Drop Down Menu*

The **Local Channel** drop down menu is used to select the channel on the selected OMI card you want to configure. The number of channels available for selection depends on the number of channel licenses you have; either 16, 32, 48, or 64 channels.

### *Partner Device Field and Browse Button*

The **Partner Device** field is used to enter the name of the device you want to communicate with. If you do not know the name of the device, use the **Browse** button to open the Discovered Devices window (see, “Discovered Devices Window” on page 41). From this window, you can select the device from a list.

### *Partner IP Address Field*

The **Partner IP Address** field is used to enter the IP Address of the device to which you want to connect. This field is automatically populated when a Partner Device is selected from the list of discovered devices using the browse button.

### *Partner Device Type Drop Down Menu*

The **Partner Type** drop down menu is used to select the type of device the OMI card is connecting to. This field is automatically populated when a Partner Device is selected from the list of discovered devices using the browse button.

### *Partner Channel Drop Down Menu*

The **Partner Channel** drop down menu is used to select which channel on the partner device should communicate with the OMI card. The number of channels available for selection depends on the partner device type. For example, if the partner device type is an OKI-2, Channel 1 and Channel 2 are the only selections available.

---

## Settings for Pass-Through Serial via Ethernet Group Box

---

### *Target Device Name Field and Browse Button*

The **Target Device Name** field is used to enter the name of the device targeted to receive the serial pass-through data. If you do not know the target device name, use the **Browse** button to open the Discovered Devices window (see, “Discovered Devices Window” on page 41). From this window, you can select the device from a list.

### *Target IP Address Field*

The **Target IP Address** field is used to enter the IP Address of the device targeted to receive the serial pass-through data. This field is populated automatically when a Target Device is selected from the list of discovered devices using the browse button.

### *Target Port Drop Down Menu*

The **Target Port** drop down menu is used to select the port to which the serial pass-through data is sent.

Available options for this field are:

*Port 1*

*Port 2*

**NOTE:** Port 2 is not used with the OMI card.

---

***Serial Baud Rate Drop Down Menu***

The **Serial Baud Rate** drop down menu is used to select the rate at which the data is transmitted over the serial port.

Available options for this field are:

*9600bps*

*19.2kbps*

*38.4kbps*

**Apply Button**

The **Apply** button applies the modifications made. The window does not close.

**Done Button**

The **Done** button closes the window without applying the modifications.



---

## Discovered Devices Window

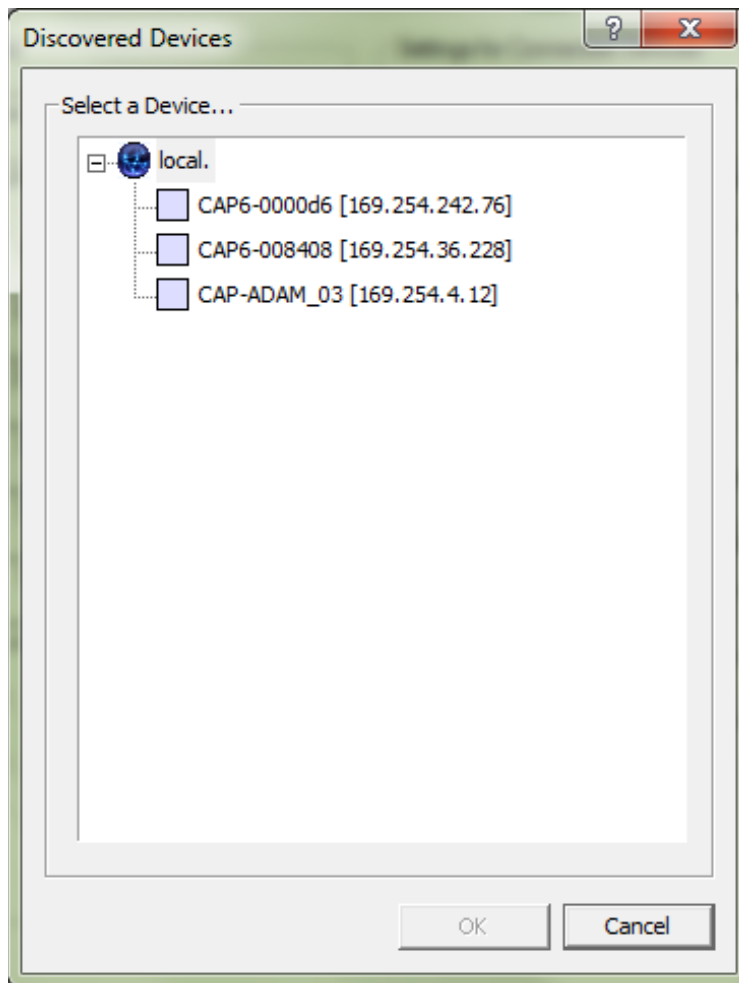


FIGURE 11. Discovered Devices Window

The **Discovered Devices** window, shown in Figure 11, is used to select devices on the network. The devices shown here are directly related to the configuration selection made on the Discovery page in Application Preferences, see “Discovery Page – Application Preferences” on page 52.

## Select Local Card and Channel

### OMNEO Card Drop Down Menu

The **OMNEO Card** drop down menu is used to select the ADAM or ADAM-M slot where OMI card for which you want to view is located in the frame.

### Device Name Field

The **Device Name** field displays the name of the device selected. This appears as the default (for example, CAP6-0000e7) or the name you have given it.

---

***Domain Name Field***

The **Domain Name** field displays the domain address where the selected card resides, if configured.

***IP Address Field***

The **IP Address** field displays the IP Address of the selected card.

***Channel Drop Down Menu***

The **Channel** drop down menu is used to select the channel for which you want to view the status. The number of channels available for selection is directly related to the number of channel licenses you have. For example, if you have an OMI-64 card installed in slot 9, you can have up to 64 channels to choose from.

***Device Type Field***

The **Device Type** field displays the type of OMNEO device the OMI card is connected to on the other end of the channel.

***Device Name Field***

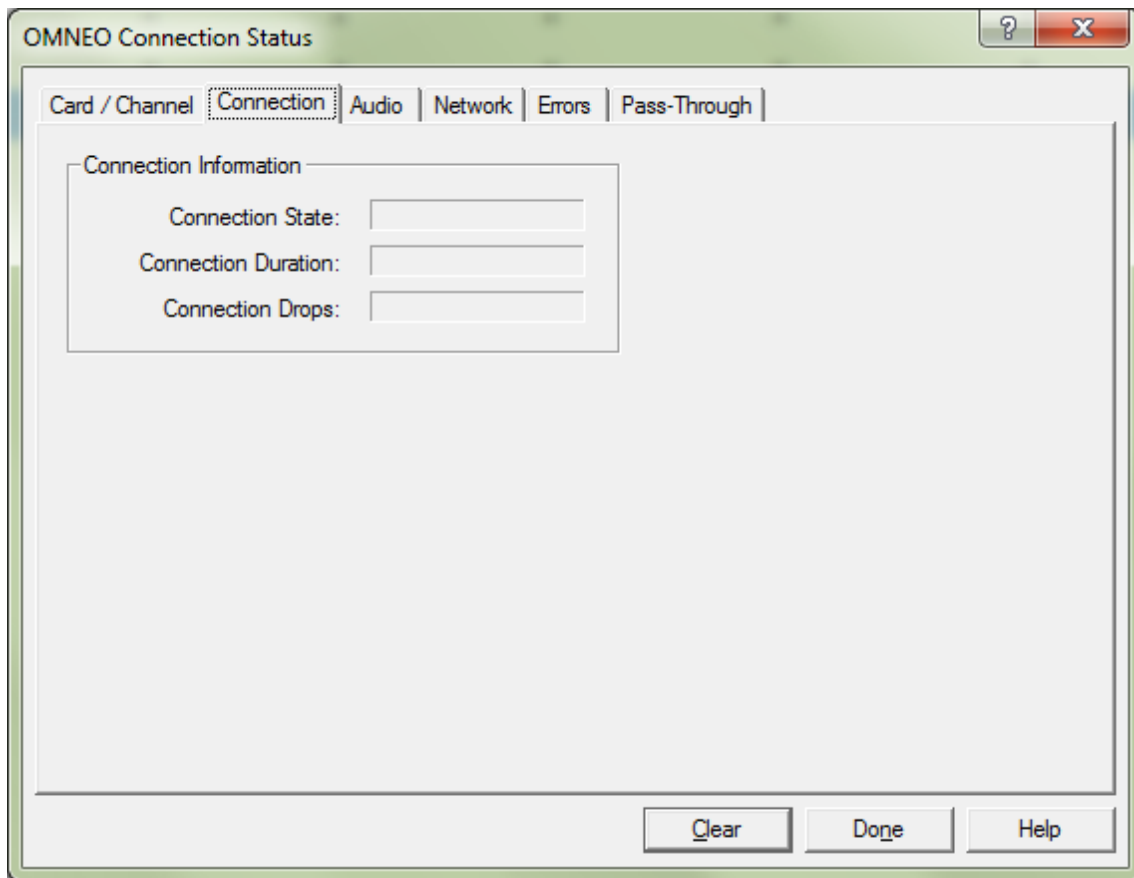

The most common statuses are Idle or Connected.

### *Connection Duration Field*

The **Connection Duration** field displays the duration of the connection. This is shown in hh/mm/ss.

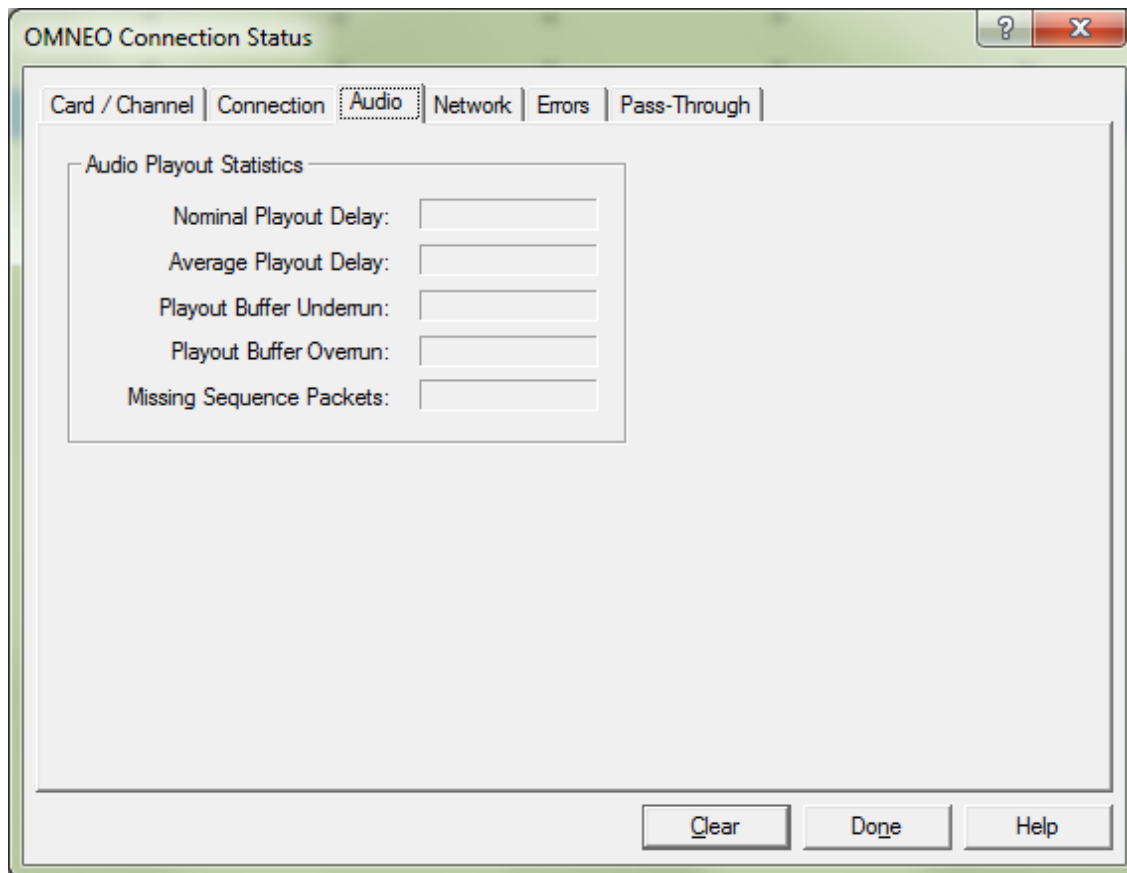
### *Connection Drops Field*

The **Connection Drops** field displays the number of times a call attempt has been dropped.

## Audio Playback Statistics Group Box

### *Nominal Playout Delay Field*

The **Nominal Playout Delay** field displays how much audio is collected before playout begins. Playout begins at half the playout buffer size, which is two (2) times the configured packet size. This is a static system setting.

### *Average Playout Delay Field*

The **Average Playout Delay** field displays the actual average audio collected before packets are played out. This is measured over the length of the connection.

***Playout Buffer Underrun Field***

The **Playout Buffer Underrun** field displays the number of times packets were not played because the playout buffer was empty.

***Playout Buffer Overrun Field***

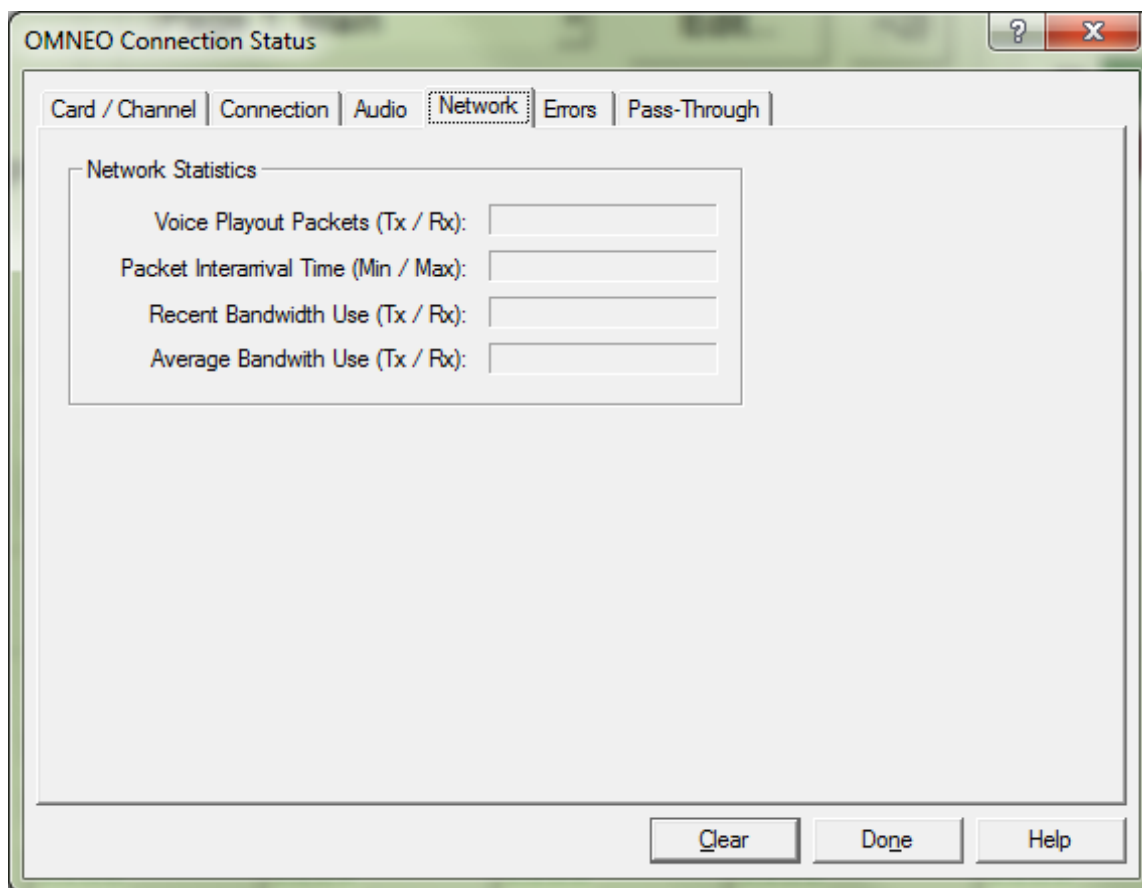
The **Playout Buffer Overrun** field displays the number of packets discarded because the playout buffer was full.

***Missing Sequence Packets Field***

The **Missing Sequence Packets** field displays how many audio packets were missed in the sequence.

***Recent Bandwidth Use (Tx / Rx) Field***

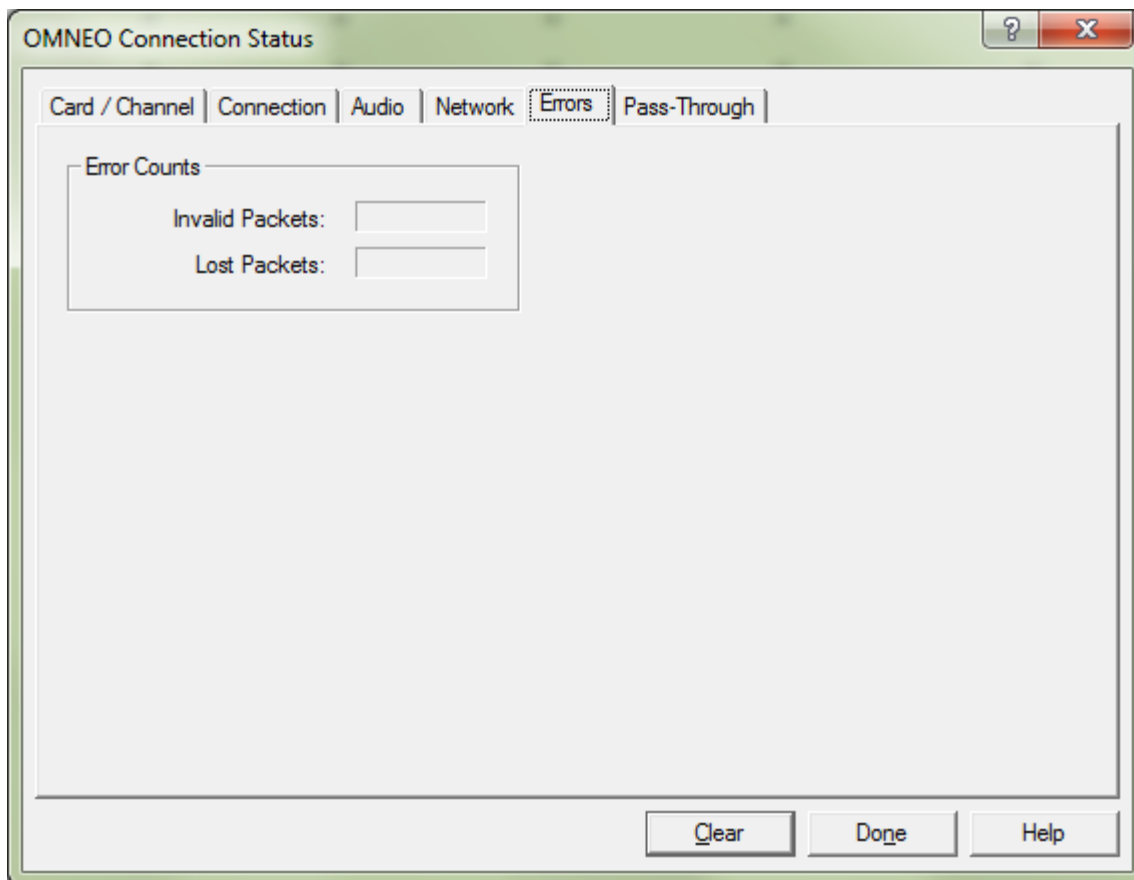
The **Recent Bandwidth Use (Tx / Rx)** field displays the amount of bandwidth used in Kbytes/sec over the length of the call. This is calculated by the number of voice packets transmitted and received over the last 10 seconds.

***Average Bandwidth Use (Tx / Rx) Field***

The **Average Bandwidth User (Tx / Rx)** field displays the amount of bandwidth used in Kbytes/sec over the length of the call. This is calculated by the number of voice packets transmitted and received and the length of the connection.

**Errors Page**

The **Errors** page displays invalid or lost packets specific to the channel and device chosen on the Card/Channel page.

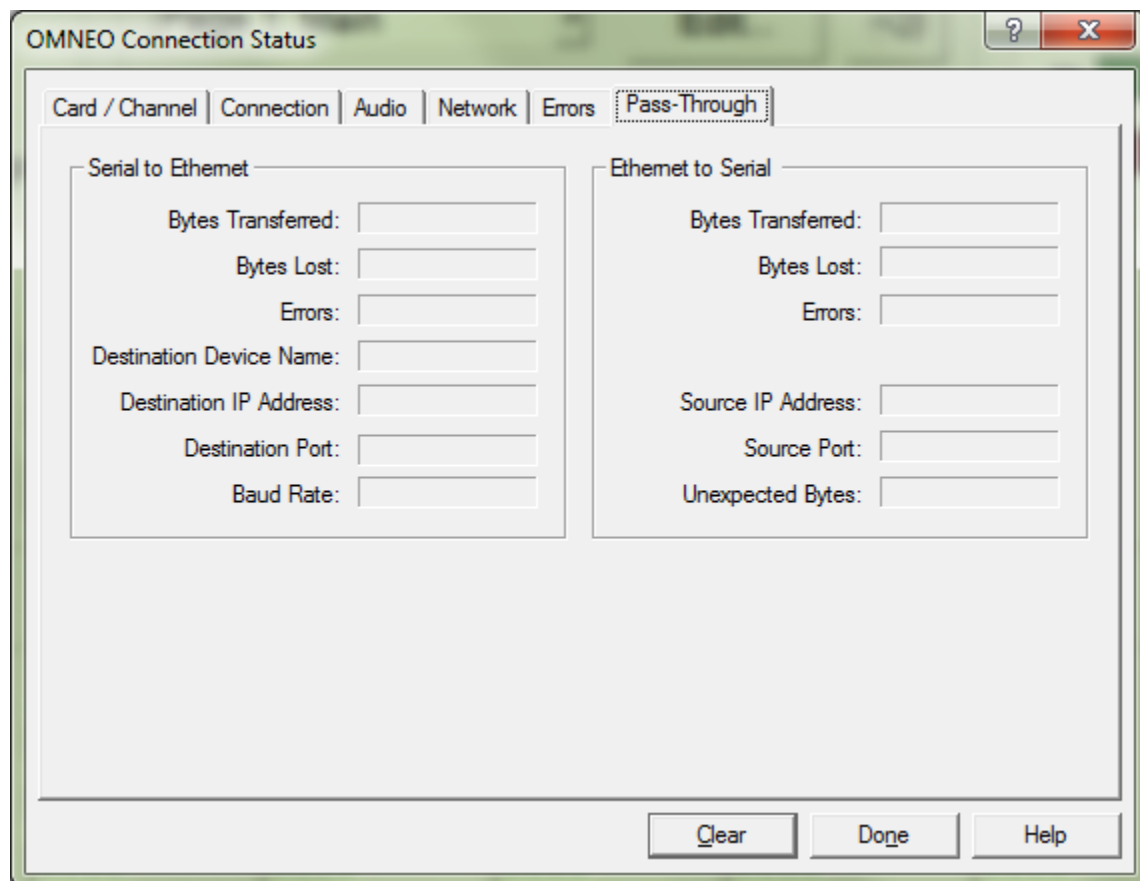
The **Invalid Packets** field displays the number of IP packets that could not be sent or received.

The **Pass-Through** page displays serial pass-through statistics specific to the channel and device chosen on the Card/Channel page.

## **Serial to Ethernet Group Box**

The **Serial to Ethernet** group box displays information about the serial data received on the serial connection and transmitted via Ethernet to a target card.

### ***Bytes Transferred Field***

The **Bytes Transferred** field displays the number of bytes transferred from the serial connection to Ethernet.

### ***Bytes Lost Field***

The **Bytes Lost** field displays the number of bytes that could not be transferred.



***Errors Field***

The **Errors** field displays the cumulative number of errors that occurred during transfer.

***Destination Device Name Field***

The **Destination Device Name** field displays the name of the device to which the serial data is transmitted.

***Destination IP Address Field***

The **Destination IP Address** field displays the IP Address of the device to which the serial data is transmitted.

***Destination Port Field***

The **Destination Port** field displays the number of the port at the other end of the connection.

***Baud Rate Field***

The **Baud Rate** field displays the baud rate of the serial connection.

---

**Ethernet to Serial Group Box**

---

The **Ethernet to Serial** group box displays the information about the serial data received on the Ethernet connection and transferred to the serial connection.

***Bytes Transferred Field***

The **Bytes Transferred** field displays the number of bytes transferred to the to serial port.

***Bytes Lost Field***

The **Bytes Lost** field displays the number of bytes that could not be transferred.

***Errors Field***

The **Errors** field displays the cumulative number of errors that occurred during transfer.

***Source IP Address Field***

The **Source IP Address** field displays the IP Address of the Ethernet source connection.

***Source Port Field***

The **Source Port** field displays the number of the port from which the source connection is using.

***Unexpected Bytes Field***

The **Unexpected Bytes** field displays the number of unexpected bytes of data.

Unexpected bytes is data that has been come from any IP Address not the Tx IP Address. The bytes of data are considered unexpected bytes and are not transferred.

### Frame Drop Down Menu

The **Frame** drop down menu is used to select the frame in which you want to configure DHCP.

### Enable DHCP Server Check Box

The **Enable DHCP Server** check box is used to enable DHCP on the frame.

### Enable DHCP Relay Check Box

The **Enable DHCP Relay** check box is used to enable the configured DHCP server to provide addresses to devices outside of its own subnet.

### Use Frame 1 DNS Servers Check Box

The **Use Frame 1 DNS Servers** check box enables using the designated DNS servers from Frame 1 as the DNS servers for any subsequent frames. This way, you do not need to retype the address for every frame.

### DNS Server 1 Field

The **DNS Server 1** field is used to enter the IP Address of the ARNI-E DNS server that supports the OMNEO devices.

### DNS Server 2 Field

The **DNS Server 2** field is used to enter the IP Address of a second DNS server, if needed, that supports the OMNEO devices.

## Range Column

The **Range** column is used to sequentially sort the different IP Address ranges your system uses, if applicable.

## First IP Address Column Field

The **First IP Address** column field is used to enter the first IP Address in the range you are defining.

## Last IP Address Column Field

The **Last IP Address** column field is used to enter the last IP Address in the range you are defining.

## Gateway Column Field

The **Gateway** column field is used to enter the gateway address used by the devices defined in this range.

## Prefix Column Field

The **Prefix** column field is used to enter the range prefix.

## Domain Column Field

The **Domain** column field is used to enter the domain or the web name used by this IP Address range.

## Load Button

The **Apply** button is used to apply the DHCP record to the MCII-e card.

## Done Button

The **Done** button is used to close the DHCP Configuration window.

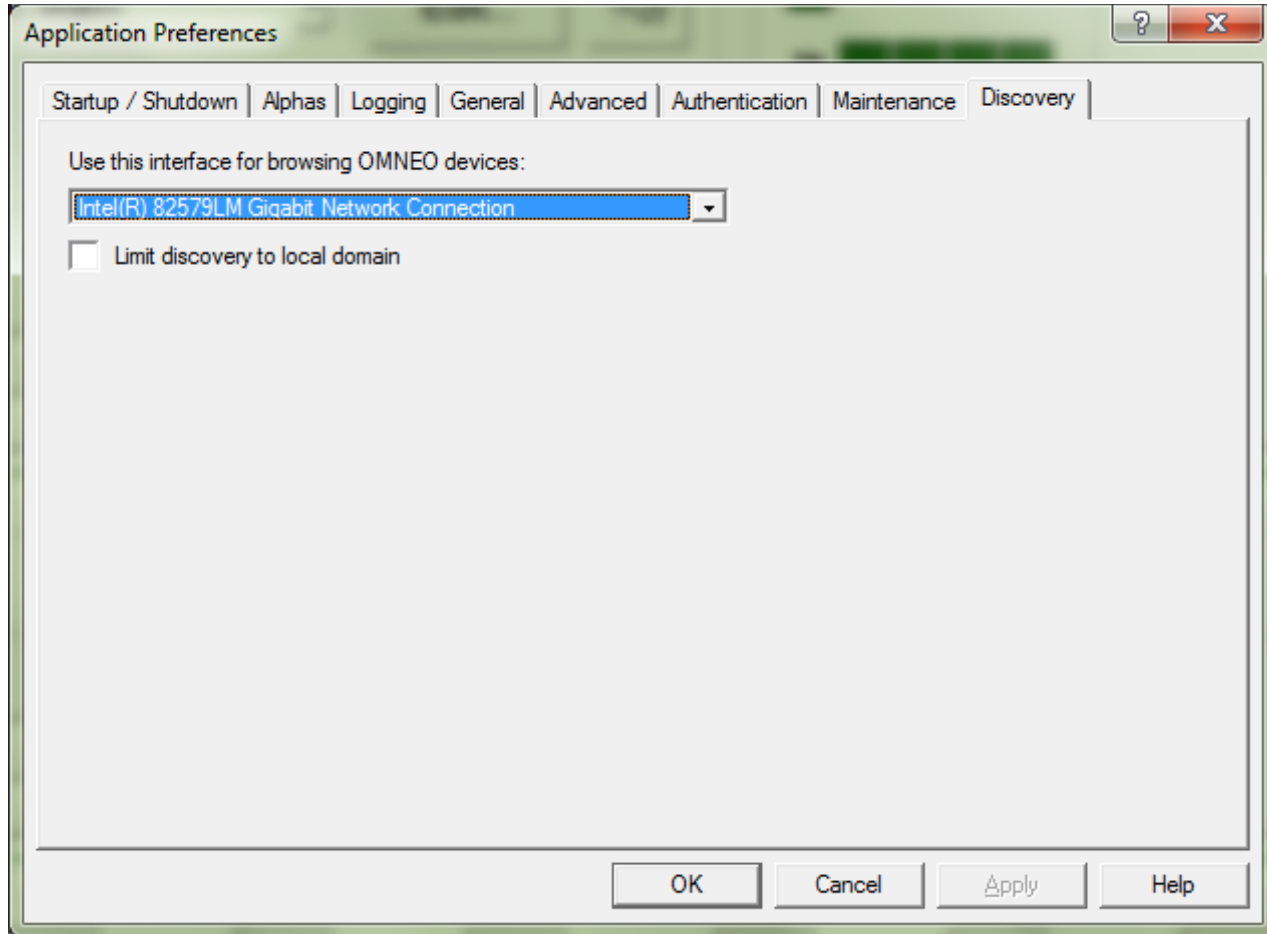

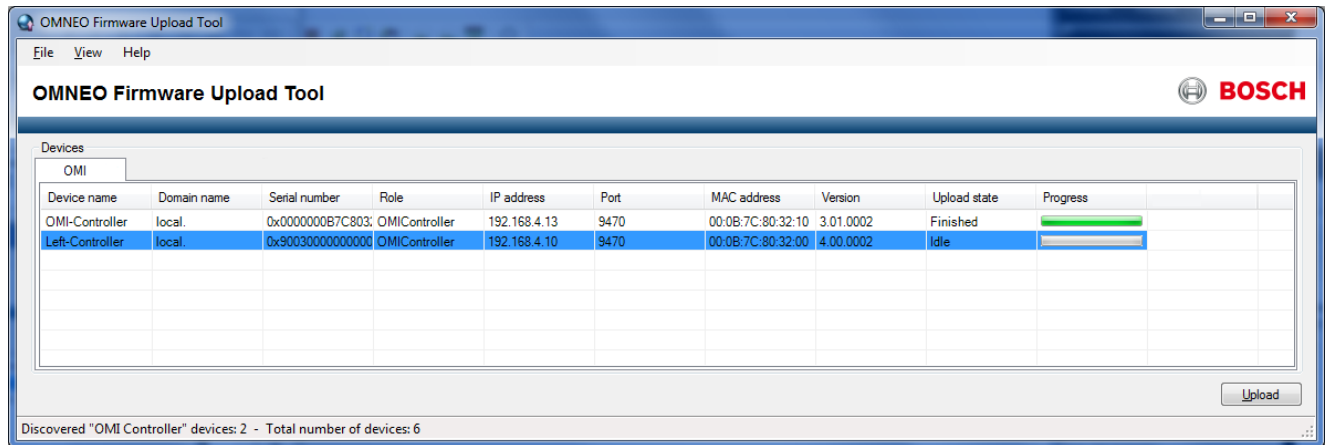

### ***Device Name Column\****

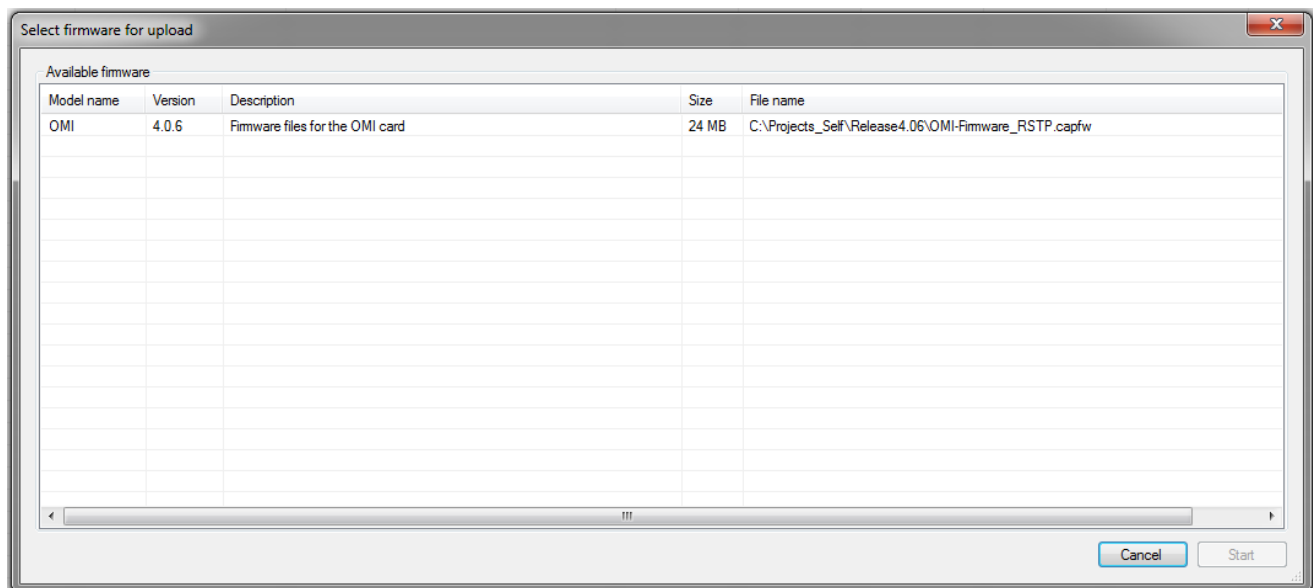
The **Progress** column displays a real-time representation of the upload progress.

### *Upload Button*

The **Upload** button opens the Select firmware for upload window (see “Select Firmware for Upload Window” on page 54).

### Select Firmware for Upload Window

The **Select Firmware for Upload** window, shown in Figure 21, is used to select the proper firmware to upload for the OMNEO device.

### Available Firmware Group Box

**Model Name Column**

The **Mode Name** column displays the name of the device model the firmware file is intended.

### Version Column

The **Version** column displays the version firmware the file contains.

**Description Column**

The **Description** column displays the description of the firmware file (for example, Firmware file s for the OMI Controller).

### *Size Column*

The Size column displays the size of the firmware file.

### *File Name Column*

The **File Name** column displays the file name and location of the firmware file.

### **Cancel Button**

The **Cancel** button closes the Select firmware for upload window.

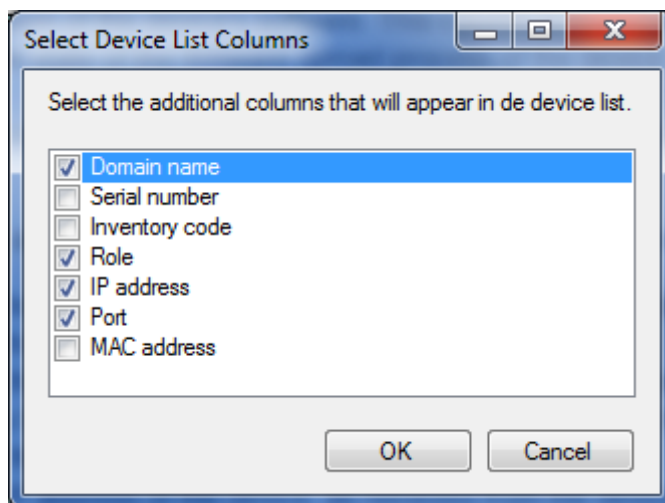
### **Start Button**

### **MAC Address Check Box**

The **MAC Address** check box is used to add the MAC Address column to the main window.

### **OK Button**

The **OK** button accepts the selections you make and applies them to the main window.

### **Cancel Button**

## Logging Window

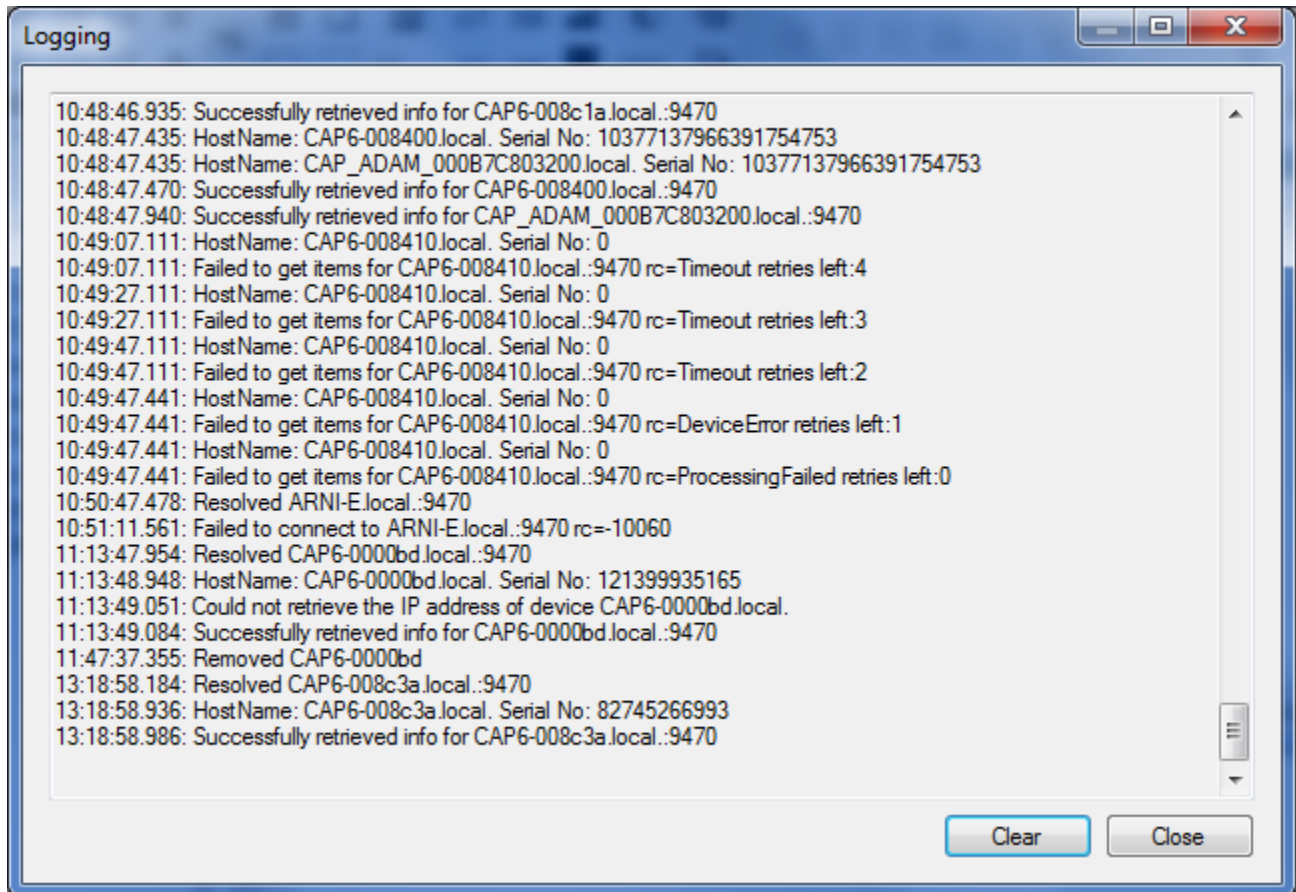


FIGURE 23. Logging Window – Firmware Upload Tool

The **Logging** window, shown in Figure 23, displays messages originated by the different components of the Firmware Upload Tool. The firmware upload log files are stored in C:\ProgramData\Bosch\OMNEO\FirmwareUploadLog. This window can be helpful in diagnostics.

### Clear Button

## *Using AZedit to Configure the OMI Card*

To **configure the OMI card in AZedit**, the following steps are needed:

- Step 1** Download the License File for more channels, if applicable.
- Step 2** Assign ports to the card using the Port Allocation table.
- Step 3** Set up the network configuration.
- Step 4** Configure Keypanels to the OMI cards.

### **Download the License File**

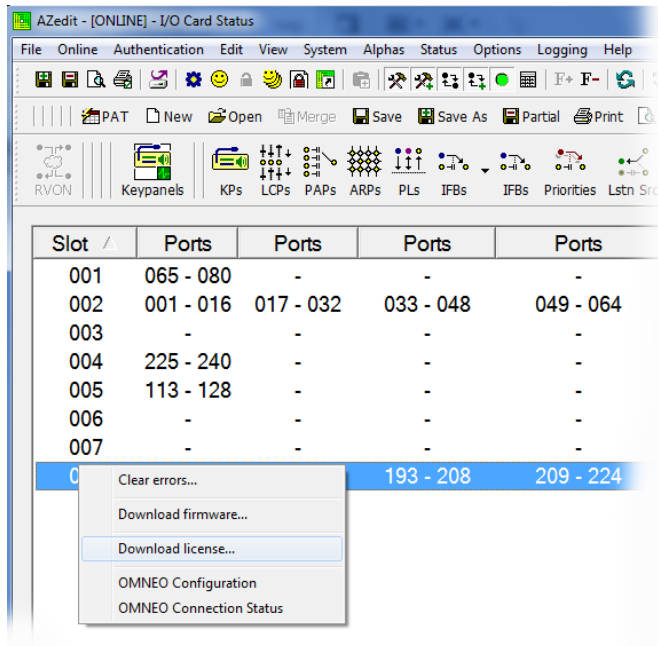
The OMI card comes with 16 licenses standard; however, incremental upgrades can be purchased from Bosch. The following upgrades are available:

- 32 licenses
- 48 licenses
- 64 licenses

To **upgrade your matrix system once the license is purchased**, do the following:

1. Start **AZedit**.
2. From the Status menu, select **Software Versions|IO Cards**.  
*The I/O Card Version Information Window appears.*

- Right-click the **OMI Card** you want to upgrade.  
*A pop-up menu appears.*



- From the pop-up menu, select **Download License**.  
*The License Download Window appears.*
- Navigate to the **license file**.
- Click **Open**.  
*The Download License File Window appears.*
- Click **Begin**.  
*The license file is downloaded. A success message appears once the file is done downloading.*
- From the Status menu, select **I/O Card Status**.  
*The I/O Card Status Window appears.*
- Verify the **download** was successful.

To **navigate to the port allocation table in AZedit**, do the following:

- Verify there are **no warnings** in the Warning column.

7. Click **Test**.  
*A success message appears if you have a valid Port Allocation Table and the Apply button becomes active.*
8. Click **Apply**.

## Set Up the Network Configuration

In an OMI system, there are three (3) ways to set up your system:

- Zero-Configuration - requires no addressing
- Static Addressing - requires manual addressing
- DHCP (also known as dynamic addressing) - requires configuring the DHCP server if you do not already have a DHCP Server on your network. If using a third-party DHCP Server, it must hand-out parameters compatible with OMNEO devices.

**NOTE:** Requires AZedit version 4.5.0 and IPedit version 3.0.0.

To **configure the OMI card**, do the following:

1. From the Status menu, select **I/O Cards**.  
*The I/O Card Status Window appears showing a list of installed cards.*
2. Right-click the **OMI Card** you want to configure.  
*A pop-up menu appears.*
3. From the pop-up menu, select **OMNEO Configuration**.

If you are using Static IP Addressing:

7. In the Partner IP Address field, enter the **IP Address** of the device to which you want to connect. This field auto-populates when you select the Device Name.
8. From the Partner Device Type drop down list, select the **type of device** to which the OMI card is connecting.
9. From the Partner Channel drop down list, select the **channel** on the device to which the OMI communicates.
10. In the Target Device Name, enter the **name** of the targeted device to receive the serial pass-through data.  
OR  
Select the Browse icon to select the **device** targeted to receive the serial pass-through data.

**NOTE:** Steps 11 through 14 are only populated when using a serial connection.

11. In the Target IP Address field, enter the **IP Address** for the device designated to receive the serial pass-through data.
12. From the Target Port drop down menu, select the **port** the serial pass-through data is sent.
13. From the Serial Baud Rate drop down menu, select the **baud rate** at which the data is transmitted for the first serial port.

**NOTE:** Configuration of the 2nd pass-through port via AZedit is not supported.

**NOTE:** You must configure the channels settings on each end of a connection to ensure the same codec and packet size are selected at each end. Remember, the OMI card has more channels which can be configured.

14. Once you are completely finished, click **Apply**.  
*Apply sends all of the changes to all the cards in the intercom, or click Cancel to discard all changes you have made.*

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## *Zero Configuration*

Zero configuration networking automatically creates a usable Internet Protocol (IP) network without human intervention or special configuration servers. It allows devices connect to a network automatically. Without zero configuration, a network administrator must set up services, such as Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) and Domain Name System (DNS), or configure each computer's network settings manually.

Both IPv4 and IPv6 have standard methods for address auto-configuration called Link Local. OMNEO's zero configuration uses link-local addressing (IPv4LL) when a DHCP server is unavailable. Link local randomly generates the host-specific part of an auto-configured address. IPv4 hosts use the special block 169.254.0.0/16., while IPv6 hosts generally combine a prefix of up to 64 bits with a 64-bit EUI-64 derived from the factory-assigned 48-bit IEEE MAC address. The MAC address has the advantage of being globally unique, a property inherited by the EUI-64. The host is normally required to ensure, through broadcast queries, that the addresses it generates are not in use by any other host on the local network.

## Configure the DHCP Server

The MCII-e Master Controller or an ARNI device can serve as the DHCP Server for the OMNEO system.

**IMPORTANT:** When the MCII-e is used as the DHCP server in a system with an ARNI device, the ARNI device must be designated as the DNS Server.

Each frame in a system can have its own DHCP server, if desired.

To **configure the DHCP server**, do the following:

1. From the Options menu, select **DHCP Server Configuration...**  
*The DHCP Server Configuration Window appears.*

2. From the Frame 1 drop down menu, select the **Frame** you want to configure DHCP (for example, Frame 1).
3. Select the **Enable DHCP Server** check box to set this frame as a DHCP server.

**IMPORTANT:** If you are using an ARNI device as the DHCP Server, verify the Enable DHCP Server check box is not selected.

4. Select the **Enable DHCP Relay** check box to allow this frame to give out Addresses to devices outside its subnet.
5. In the DNS Server 1 field, enter the **IP Address of the DNS (Domain Name Server)**.

**IMPORTANT:** If you are using an ARNI device in your system, the DNS Server address is the IP Address of the ARNI device.

6. In the DNS Server 2 field, enter the **IP Address of a second DNS server**, if applicable.
7. In the First IP Address column, enter the **IP Address** of the first address in the range.
8. In the Last IP Address column, enter the **IP Address** of the last address in the range.
9. In the Gateway column, enter the **Gateway Address** that is used.
10. In the Netmask column, enter the **Netmask**.
11. In the Domain column, enter the **Address** of the domain.

12. Repeat steps 7 through 11 for the number of ranges you want to configure.
13. Once finished, click **Save**.  
*The DHCP record is saved.*
14. Click **Apply**.  
*The DHCP configuration is applied to the intercom setup and the window closes.*

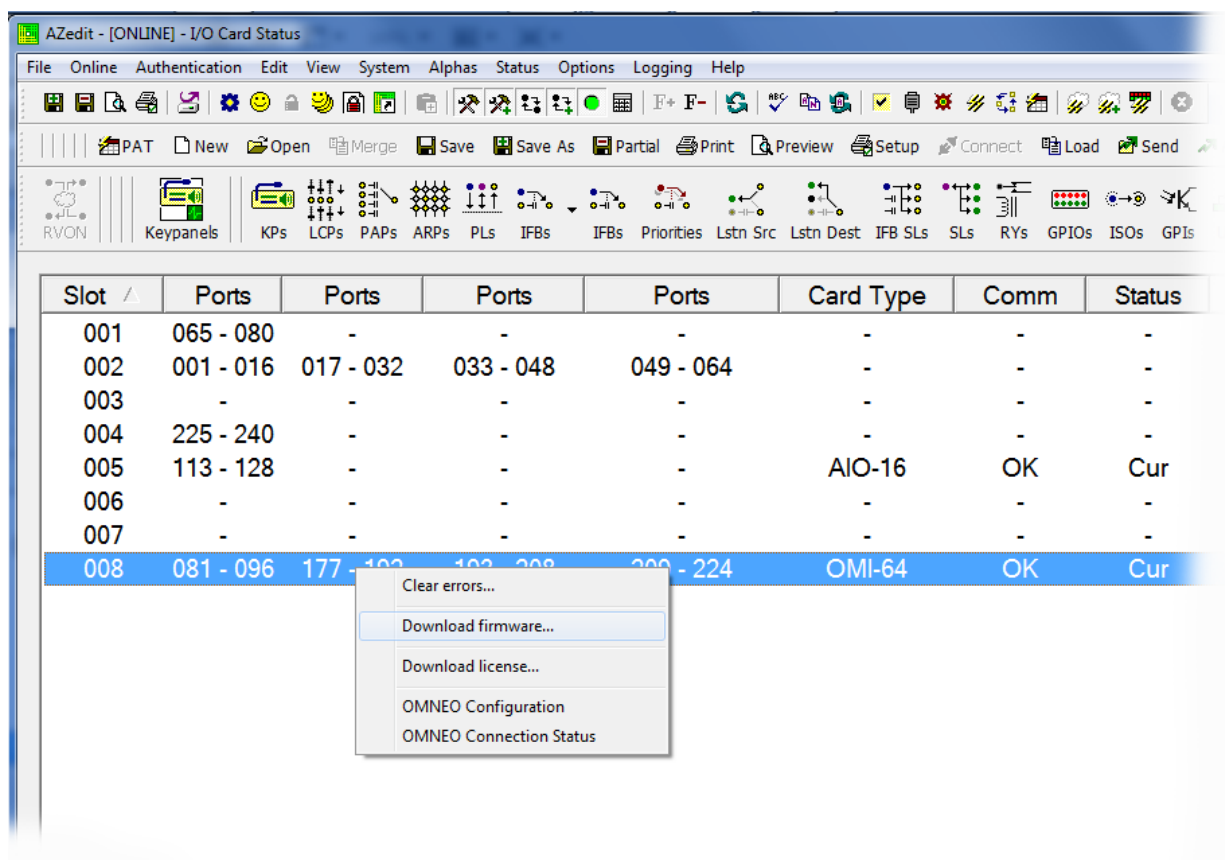

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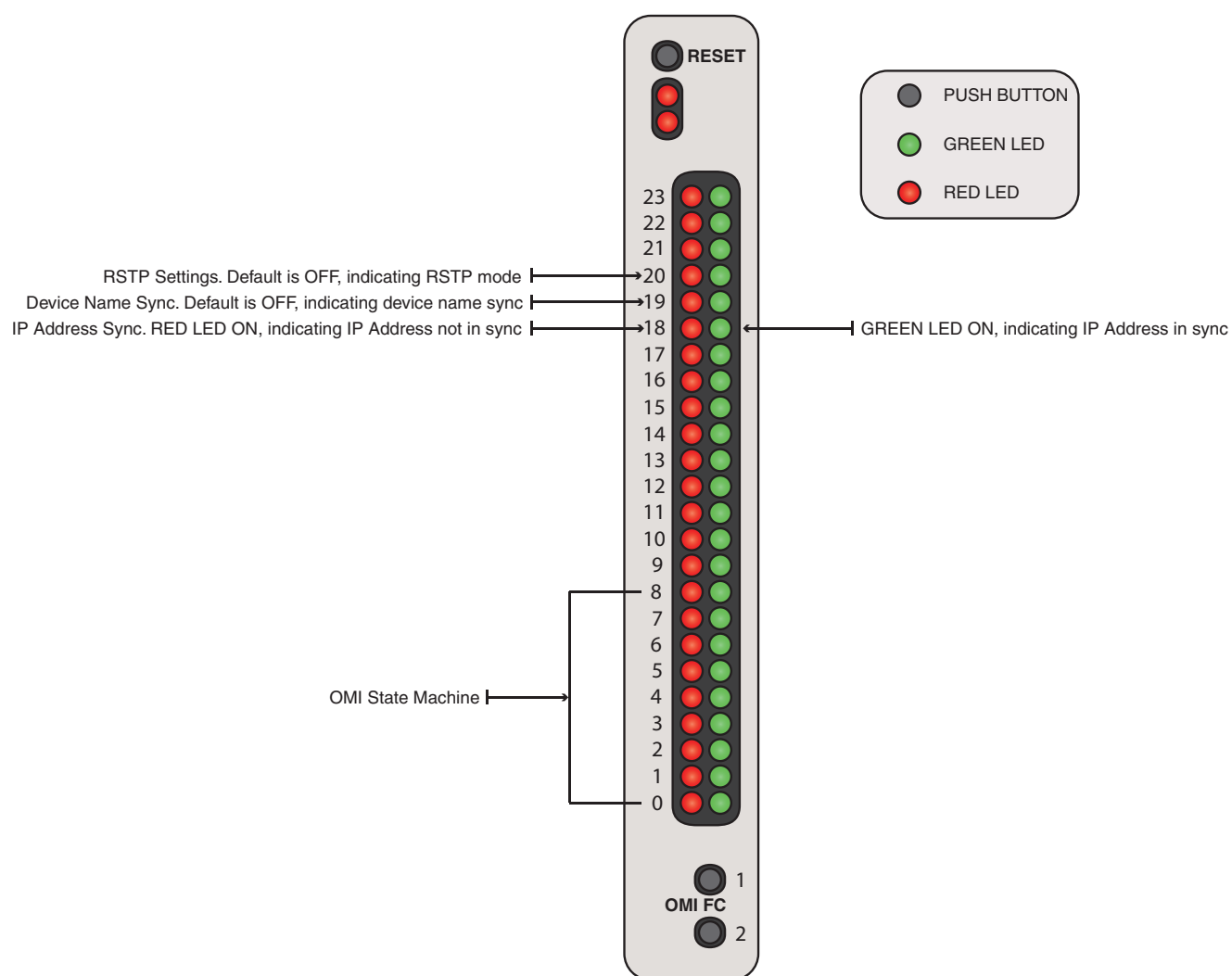

## Page 0 OMI State Machine Description

**RED LED 0–8.** The red LED's from 0 to 8 indicate the state of the OMI firmware and can be used for diagnostics in the event of failure. The following are details and descriptions of the LED indicators.

OMI (Not Connected to its Audio Device)		OMI–Initialized
0	OMI Controller Initializing	Blinking OMI is working OK. Solid or Off then OMI is in one of the states mentioned in second column
1	OMI–Controller identifying its Audio Device	Blink every five (5) seconds, retrieving Audio Device Information (Name, IP information)
2	OMI–Controller verifying the Device Name	Blink/On when trying to resolve one of the devices in the channel configuration
3	OMI–Controller Registering	Blink every five (5) seconds. Keep Alive status with the connected devices (OKI, OEI2, etc.)
4	OMI–Controller resolved its Audio Device	Blinks whenever a KP message is sent
5	OMI–Controller connecting to its Audio Device	Blinks whenever a KP message is received
6	OMI Parsing the configuration information	ON to indicate there is a configuration change via AZedit/IPedit
7		ON to indicate the OMI is configured for static
8		ON to indicate the configuration file was received from the MCIIe

**RED LED 9–10.** The red LEDs 9 and 10 turn on when an Internal Error is detected. The OMI card needs to be manually reset by pushing the Reset button.

**RED LED 0, 2, 4, 6 and LED 1, 3, 5, 7.** When the application issues a reset, LEDs 0, 2, 4, 6 are alternately turned on and off. After 100ms, LEDs 1, 3, 5, 7 are alternately turned on and off.
